Learning Goals

The Ailey/Fordham B.F.A. in Dance program trains students to hone their professional skills, prepare for life as a professional dancer, and be among the vanguard of the finest and most versatile dancers. Students follow a diverse curriculum that includes a carefully designed sequence of dance and liberal arts courses, encouraging students to achieve their artistic and academic potential.

Students will be exposed to a variety of academic disciplines that will help them cultivate the critical intelligence and creative imagination necessary for them to flourish as artists and humans. They will be immersed in diverse academic learning experiences that encourage curiosity, animate broad and deep engagement, develop writing, research, and analytical skills, and foster a commitment to social justice.

Students will develop a deep scientific understanding of the body and its movements in their study of anatomy and kinesiology. Students will also garner a broad understanding of the world history of dance and music, and in particular the important history and legacy of African and African American dance, music, and other cultural forms that inform the teachings and ethos of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and its Ailey School.
